
SPRAW's **New Instagram Account**

Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Workshop

Coming back from our holiday break, on Jan. 10th, WA's Counseling Department conducted a very relevant workshop for all our faculty (teachers), some admin staff also participated. The main topic of their presentation was: Social and Emotional Learning (SEL). SEL has often been used as an umbrella term to represent a wide array of non-academic skills that individuals need in order to set goals, manage behavior, build relationships, and process and remember information. These skills and competencies develop across our lives and are essential to success in school, work, home, and community. What is the key to a high-quality social-emotional learning program that makes a lasting impact? It has to be a whole-school effort, according to developmental psychologist Stephanie Jones and her research team at the Harvard Graduate School of Education. Therefore, WA's Counseling Department is working hard on getting administrators, teachers, and parents on board with strategies and practices we can all follow to help our students' social and emotional development.













School Safety Patrol is Back!

We are happy to announce that our School Safety Patrol (SSP) is back! This program is part of the 7th Grade Orientación & Convivencia curriculum and accounts for 20% of their final grade in this subject. 7th graders participate as patrollers who stand along WA's Calle Interna, greeting parents and students politely during our morning entry routine. Their job is to help younger students get out of the car safely and into the school. They need to do so in a timely manner to avoid traffic congestion. Their service lasts one week. Then, the supervising teacher picks a Stellar Patroller who will become next week's Brigadier, and who will be assisting along with another group of patrollers. All SSP members wear bright vests to distinguish themselves, and the Brigadier wears a special mesh vest and a special WA pin.

These SSP programs benefit students, school, and communities. Students gain safety awareness, leadership, teamwork, pride, citizenship, and respect for rules and regulations. Our school benefits from opportunities to promote traffic safety awareness, peer-to-peer education, and character building opportunities. Communities gain from safer environments, a positive collaboration between students, parents, faculty and staff, and a spirit of civic-mindedness. Thank you 7th graders! We truly appreciate your help every morning!

Seniors Develop Environmental Awareness

Environmental Awareness is a priority here in Washington. That is why our IBDP (International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme) Biology and Environmental Systems and Societies (ESS) teachers organized a field trip for Seniors to Candilejas beach in La Guaira state. They left school grounds on Thursday, January 19th, at 7:30 am, and got to Candilejas midmorning, Students divided into groups and worked on what the IBDP calls a practical scheme of work for the different subjects. For Biology, they did an analysis of the environmental variables such as temperature, atmospheric pressure, ocean currents, wave and tidal movements, among others. For ESS, they made an inventory of solid waste, and learned how to measure microplastics content in the beach's sand to estimate the impact of plastic pollution in the area. Seniors learned how to do sand sampling by creating a 50 x 50 cm quadrat. Through this practice, they discovered firsthand the pervasiveness and magnitude of plastic pollution in our beaches. We hope this awareness will bring forth behavioral changes in our students and their families that contribute to the sustainability of our natural resources.





10th Grade visits Universidad Católica Andrés Bello

On Wednesday, January 25th, our 10th graders (3er año) and a group of teachers visited Universidad Católica Andrés Bello (UCAB) to see the Techo Verde (green roof), a thesis project done by UCAB students. It is called green roof because a garden was built on it to help improve the graduate studies building's overheating issues. Solar panels were installed to provide electricity to the rooftop and some classrooms in the building. This green roof currently lowers the building's core temperature 5 degrees celsius, decreasing the need for air conditioning.

After the green roof tour, the visit took an unexpected turn when the students were invited by the UCAB's Vice Rector to explore the university's new areas. A total of four new areas have been opened in the last few years, and our students had the opportunity to visit them all with a guided presentation. These are: ESportsUCAB (game programming and developing), Academia Costura+Moda (fashion and design), Academia LAGA (gastronomy and cuisine) and the Prototipista e Impresión 3D laboratory (prototyping and 3D printing). In addition, 10th graders also visited two art exhibits and the main library. Students arrived at UCAB at 8 am, and a tour that was meant to last just one hour, extended until noon. This visit to Techo Verde, as a field trip organized by IBMYP (International Baccalaureate's Middle Years Programme) Biology and Action & Service, taught our students about sustainability, care for the environment, and about how to maximize resources we already have. Furthermore, it showed students that it is possible to turn projects (MYP's Personal Project or DP's Extended Essay) into realities that impact our communities.







Venezuelan Everest Climber takes our Juniors to Sagarmatha

Architect Marcus Tobia is the founder of a team of Venezuelan mountaineers called *Proyecto Cumbre* (*PC*). Among his major achievements with PC are: first national ascents to the main peaks of the world, including the climb to Everest (8,848 m), the highest mountain of the planet, in the year 2001; in 2004, *PC* made the first Venezuelan Expedition to the North Pole; and in 2006, the first Venezuelan Expedition to the South Pole. Most recently, is participating in SOS ARCTIC 2022 project, a scientific expedition that will cross the island of Greenland aboard the Wind Sled with a clear mission: science and innovation to gain greater knowledge of climate change and improve the future of our planet.













Tobias also built a mountain refuge/climbing school, at 3,500 m above sea level, in the state of Mérida called Sagarmatha (see video attached to this issue of Hello Washington!). It is currently the only mountain climbing school of its kind in Venezuela. It is located more specifically between Apartaderos and the Mucubají lagoon. On Saturday, January 21st, all our Juniors (11th Grade / 4to año) went on a field trip to Sagarmatha with Mr. Tobia himself. The trip lasted a whole week. Juniors spent a day acclimatizing to the new altitude. On Sunday, they visited the Mucubají lagoon and Laguna Negra, and received a mountain climbing briefing. On Monday, they climbed La Babosa, a rock especially prepared with equipment for practicing climbing techniques. Then, Juniors received a course on geographical orientation with maps and compasses and watched a video of Mr. Tobia's Everest expedition. On Tuesday, they went mountain biking and learned to set up camp (tents) and finished their day cooking pastelitos andinos. On Wednesday, they visited local public schools: Jose Victoriano Lobo and Unidad Educativa Bolivariana La Mucuchache. In both schools, they planned and coordinated recreational activities for students and teachers such as: storytelling, painting, arts and crafts, board games, and sports workouts. After this, they were transported to El Guache lagoon; from here they hiked towards the base of Pico Gavilán where they set up camp. The next morning, the team of Juniors, teachers, and guides climbed to the summit at 4,250 m above sea level. After celebrating this great accomplishment, they descended and returned to Sagarmatha. On Friday 27th, they returned to Caracas safely, and with a new set of life skills.

First Aid Training for Faculty and Staff

Because safety always comes first, a selected group of faculty and admin staff participated, on Friday, Jan. 27th and Saturday 28th, in a first aid training workshop which included two 4 hoursessions of theory and practice. This training is also called *PAMI (Proveedores de Auxilio Médico Inmediato)* and was delivered on school grounds. Sessions were provided by *Fundación Venemergencia's* First Aid training team, who have been conducting these courses in Venezuela for over 10 years. The program included the following topics:

- · Initial assessment of a victim
- · Wounds / injuries, hemorrhages, and burns
- · Fractures, sprains, and dislocations
- · CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) for adults and children
- · Bandages, immobilization
- · Transportation of victims

Even though several first aid workshops have been done at WA in the past, recent events have shown the importance of this initiative becoming a regular practice. We need to be more prepared to help adults and children during diverse emergency situations.
