### WA Picnic

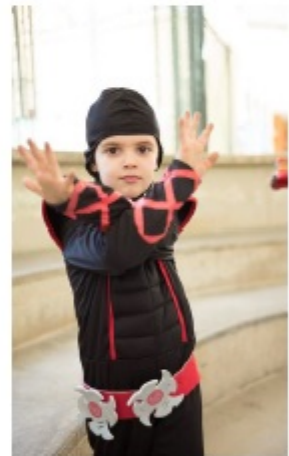
