The library became a refuge for students, parents, and the wider Washington community, a testament to Kathy's dream.

When Beverly retired, Mercedes continued working with Teresa Bigott, Carmen Belén Arria, Maria Fernanda Schweitzer, and Maria Isabel Pérez de Casanova at different times. Maria Isabel and Mercedes continued working together until Mercedes retired at the age of 80 in 2008.





Time, however, leaves its mark. The pandemic took its toll, and the library needed a fresh start. Inspired by Kathy's spirit, we embarked on a mission to revitalize this cherished space. In collaboration with experts from the Central University of Venezuela library, we began by carefully curating the collection, donating outdated books to other institutions and making room for new treasures.

But our vision goes beyond bookshelves. We envision a library that is a hub of learning, creativity, and innovation, a space that adapts to the needs of our students and embraces the evolving landscape of education. This is why we are thrilled to announce the "Picking up where we left" Renovation Project 2023-2024!


8th Graders Lead the Way with the SSP Program

The School Safety Patrol (SSP) program is an integral part of the 8th Grade Orientación & Ciudadanía curriculum at Washington Academy. Dedicated 8th graders step up as patrollers, proudly taking their positions along WA's inner street each morning. With courtesy and enthusiasm, they greet parents and students, ensuring a smooth and welcoming entry routine.

The core responsibility of these young leaders lies in assisting younger students. They help them safely exit vehicles and navigate their way into the school building efficiently, all while keeping traffic flowing smoothly. Since March 2023, a dedicated group of our Preschool and Elementary teachers has been embarked on a journey of professional development, exploring the world of autism and its implications for the classroom. Partnering with our neighbors, *Fundación Autismo en Voz Alta*, this initiative equips educators with the knowledge and skills to foster inclusive learning environments for all students.

Fundación Autismo en Voz Alta, a non-profit NGO established in Caracas, Venezuela in 2006, has long been dedicated to supporting the inclusion and development of children with autism. Their expertise forms the cornerstone of this training program, which has two primary objectives:

- Enhanced Understanding: Keeping teachers up-to-date on the latest research and insights into Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is crucial. The program delves into key concepts, fostering a deeper comprehension of this complex condition.
- Inclusive Pedagogy: By equipping educators with practical strategies, the program empowers
 them to tailor their teaching methods to the unique strengths and challenges of every student,
 regardless of their individual needs.

The course, delivered through a hybrid format, combines online modules, via Learnsity, with interactive face-to-face sessions. Each module, "Understanding Autism" and "Intervention for Autism", comprises a comprehensive set of lessons and activities, designed to provide a well-rounded educational experience.

On November 27th, the culmination of the program took place in our multi-purpose room, where teachers engaged in a vibrant Q&A session with a specialist, solidifying their understanding and addressing their specific questions.

Through ongoing professional development, we empower our teachers to create classrooms where all students, regardless of their abilities, can thrive.
