

Exploring Geopolitics: 11th Grade Learns About the Essequibo Territory

On Thursday, January 18th, our 11th Grade students had the opportunity to dive into the complex geopolitical issue of the Essequibo Territory. Mr. Estrada, who holds a Bachelor of Arts in International Studies and is currently pursuing a Master's in Political Science, led the engaging talk. Mr. Estrada, also a university professor, provided valuable insights into this disputed territory.

The informative session, held in the multipurpose room from 2:00 - 3:20 pm, was coordinated by our IBDP Global Politics teacher. Students learned about the Essequibo Territory, a region currently controlled by Guyana but also claimed by Venezuela. They explored the historical roots of this ongoing dispute, including the Geneva Agreement, and why the Essequibo Territory's location and resources make it strategically significant.















Recycling Innovators Visit WA

On the morning of Monday, January 22nd, our 8th and 9th Grade students enjoyed a fascinating presentation on "Recycling in Venezuela and its Implications." The talk, held in the multipurpose room, was delivered by Gabriel Santana and Alberto Alfonzo, founders of the innovative entrepreneurship *Taller Neo* (@taller.neo). This event was coordinated by our IB MYP Action and Service teacher and our Biology Department Head.

Taller Neo specializes in transforming waste into valuable objects. They work with plastics like polypropylene and high-density polyethylene, creating a remarkable array of usable items including t-shirts, backpacks, shoes, eyeglass frames, wallets, plastic pots, and more. Students learned about the importance of recycling and were inspired by Taller Neo's creative approach.

This engaging talk wasn't just informative, it provided valuable insights for our 8th and 9th graders. They gained a deeper understanding of the impact of recycling on the environment, and were motivated by the possibilities of transforming waste into useful objects. Seeing *Taller Neo*'s innovative approach firsthand sparked their creativity and encouraged them to think critically about their own environmental impact, both at school and in their daily lives. This aligns perfectly with the school's commitment to fostering environmental awareness and responsible citizenship in our students.
