4th Graders Score a Touchdown at the Math Fair!

Working in teams of 3, they chose a sport and dug deep to discover how math plays a vital role on the field, court, or track.

Here's the game plan:

First, a special meeting equipped parents with the tools to support their young mathematicians throughout the project.

Then, students received a guideline to help them develop their projects. This questionnaire encouraged them to reflect and explore different mathematical concepts like graphing, measurement, data analysis, and more, all within the context of their chosen sport and their math knowledge.

For example, a team that chose track and field went for the gold, researching world records in long jump, hurdles, and pole vault. They created bar graphs to compare achievements between men and women, and even charted the progress of these records over time with line graphs – proving that math is a true champion!

Another group, inspired by ice skating, delved into the icy world of rink dimensions, calculating areas and distances with precision worthy of a gold medal performance.

This year's Math Fair boasted an impressive line-up of sports, with teams tackling everything from Formula 1 racing to horseback riding, American football to tennis – showcasing the vast variety of ways math plays a role in athletic endeavors.

Each team presented their findings on a captivating triptych (a three-paneled display board) and a stand overflowing with creative visuals. It was a true display of teamwork, problem-solving skills, and of course, a love for math!

The WA 4th graders proved that math isn't just about numbers on a page – it's the foundation for so many amazing things, even the competitions we love to watch.

Gearing Up for Great Thinking: Students Tackle the Recreational Math and Language Olympics!



- Ángel Inciarte (7th Grade) and Paula Spuches (8th Grade) received verbal mentions for their contributions.








Soaring to New Heights: 7th Graders **Gear Up for High School!**

They shed light on the programs they offer, the path to admission, and most importantly, answered all the burning questions our 11th graders had about their future careers.

Junior year is a prime time to explore options. By connecting with international institutions, our students get a head start on planning their academic futures. They discover new programs, gain insights into global career trends, and most importantly, build the confidence to explore the world with their education.

Judging by the lively Q&A session, it seems our Juniors were eager to explore possibilities!

















4th Graders Take a Trip Through the Digestive System!

On Thursday, February 1st, our awesome 4th graders embarked on a fascinating journey – a trip through their very own digestive system! But this wasn't your typical bus tour. This expedition involved science, teamwork, and a whole lot of fun! Their mission was to crack the digestive code! The goal? To understand how our bodies break down food and use it for energy.

Our young scientists learned about two key players in this process: mechanical and chemical digestion. Imagine chomping down on your favorite snack. That's mechanical digestion in action! Your teeth mash and grind the food into smaller pieces.

Now, it was time to get hands-on! In a super cool experiment, students placed food in a ziplock bag (representing the mouth) and added some water (like saliva). They then became human blenders, squishing and mixing the food, mimicking chewing. This yummy mush was then transformed into a "bolus," just like the food entering the stomach.

The stomach is where things get interesting! Here, both mechanical and chemical digestion take place. Just like in our experiment, students added pretend digestive juices to further break down the food. This mixture became "chyme," ready for the next part of its adventure.

The chyme then traveled to a special tube with a sticky surface, representing the small intestine. Imagine all the important nutrients being absorbed through these sticky walls, giving our bodies the energy to run, jump, and play!

Finally, the leftover material entered cups symbolizing the large intestine. Here, water is absorbed, and solid waste forms. This waste is then eliminated from the body, just like in our experiment.

This interactive activity gave our 4th graders a fantastic visual representation of the digestive system's incredible journey. They learned that even though some parts of digestion might seem "gross," they're all essential for keeping our bodies healthy and strong!

A huge thank you to our 4th Grade Science teacher, for guiding our young scientists on this exciting exploration of the digestive system! Their enthusiasm and creativity made learning about digestion a blast!

6th & 7th Graders Dish Up Delicious Health!

Get ready to have your taste buds tantalized and your healthyeating game leveled up! Our amazing 6th and 7th graders, led by the MYP Physical and Health Education teachers, completed in the month of February a project called "Healthy Living." It was a culinary adventure that combined creativity, knowledge, and, of course, deliciousness!

Our 7th graders showcased their inner pastry chefs, whipping up healthy desserts that were both tasty and good for you.

The 6th graders tackled the most important meal of the day, crafting healthy breakfast options to fuel up your mornings with a very special ingredient: microgreens! Theys didn't just cook, they planted and nurtured a variety of microgreens, tiny powerhouses packed with nutrients.

Each grade level held presentations, with separate events for our girls' and boys' groups. Before the culinary delights arrived, a student kicked things off by explaining what microgreens are and the characteristics of a healthy breakfast and dessert. Then, the fun began!

Organized into smaller teams, students presented their creations. They explained the ingredients, nutrients, and total calories, making healthy choices easy and delicious. They even showed off the materials and procedures needed to whip up these healthy wonders at home!

But the learning didn't stop there! Each team also explained why their dish was considered healthy and how they incorporated the attributes of the IB Learner Profile into their project. Talk about well-rounded young chefs!

The 6th graders were particularly impressed with their microgreen mastery. They grew a diverse selection, including chia, kale, sunflower, radish, and even black bean microgreens! These tiny plants are packed with a nutritional punch, adding a vibrant touch and a boost of vitamins to any dish.

What's Yo Caudillo?

Imagine stepping into the shoes of a powerful leader! In Yo Caudillo, students did just that. Each received an assigned historical leader, from the inspiring likes of Mahatma Gandhi to the controversial figures like Adolf Hitler.



Dress Up, Speak Up!

The fun didn't stop there. Students came to class transformed! Dressed in period attire, they embodied their assigned leader. But the real test wasn't the costume – it was the first-person presentations. Facing their classmates as historical interviewers, students answered questions about their leadership style, the challenges they faced, and the impact they left on their countries.

Our MYP Coordinator kicked off all presentation by explaining the MYP assessment criteria. After this, students introduced their characters and tackled questions like:

- · "What kind of leader were you?"
- "How did you rise to power?" (democratically elected or a selfproclaimed leader?)
- · Imagine your country without you. How would it be different?
- Knowing what you know now, what would you change about your time in power?"

These thought-provoking questions pushed students to think critically about historical figures and the complex decisions they made. Imagine having to justify your actions as a historical leader – talk about pressure!

Whether it was Winston Churchill's wartime determination or Salvador Allende's fight for social justice, *Yo Caudillo* brought history to life.

Our 7th graders not only learned about these international and national iconic figures, but also developed valuable research, communication, and critical thinking skills. It was a week of learning, imagination, and a whole lot of "living history!"





















10th Graders Visit UCAB!

On February 2nd, our 10th graders and a group of teachers visited Universidad Católica Andrés Bello (UCAB) to see the Techo Verde (green roof), a thesis project done by UCAB students. It is called green roof because a garden was built on it to help improve the graduate studies building's overheating issues. Solar panels were installed to provide electricity to the rooftop and some classrooms in the building. This green roof currently lowers the building's core temperature 5 degrees celsius, decreasing the need for air conditioning. After the green roof tour, the students were invited to explore the university's new areas. A total of five new areas have been opened in the last few years, and our students had the opportunity to visit them all with a guided presentation. These are: ESportsUCAB (game programming and developing), Academia Costura+Moda (fashion and design), Academia LAGA (gastronomy and cuisine), and the Prototipista e Impresión 3D laboratory (prototyping and 3D printing).



They also visited 3 other labs from the Architecture Department: one for materials and architectural technology, one for digital media, and one for experiential learning. These laboratories are equipped with cutting-edge technology and equipment and are available to the more than 300 students enrolled in the architecture program at the university, as well as to the rest of the UCAB student and faculty community.

In addition, 10th graders also visited art exhibits and the main library. Students arrived at UCAB at 8 am, and a tour that was meant to last just one hour, extended until noon. This visit to Techo Verde, as a field trip organized by IBMYP (International Baccalaureate's Middle Years Programme) Biology and Action & Service, taught our students about sustainability, care for the environment, and about how to maximize resources we already have. Furthermore, it showed students that it is possible to turn projects (MYP's Personal Project or DP's Extended Essay) into realities that impact our communities.

8th Graders Explore Cuevas del Indio

On Thursday, February 15th, our intrepid 8th Grade set off on an exciting adventure to Cuevas del Indio, a hidden gem right here in Caracas! Organized by our dedicated school counselor, this wasn't your ordinary field trip. It was an outdoor expedition designed to build teamwork and social-emotional skills.

Led by their trusty guides – including their counselor, MYP Design, Math, and PE teachers – the 8th graders donned their spelunking spirit (well, maybe comfy shoes!) and ventured into the caverns. They explored a fascinating section of the caves, uncovering the secrets hidden beneath the surface.
