HMUN is a prestigious four-day international relations simulation specifically designed for high school students. Students attending HMUN act as delegates from various countries, debating and discussing pressing global issues. Through diplomacy and collaboration, they strive to find creative solutions to these challenges. Renowned for its tradition and innovative approach, HMUN provides a valuable experience for all participants.

Selected students will embark on a rigorous preparation process leading up to the January conference. This includes in-depth research on assigned countries and their positions on global issues, developing persuasive arguments, honing public speaking skills, and practicing negotiation and collaboration techniques. It's a demanding but rewarding experience that helps students develop essential skills like:

- Public Speaking: delivering clear and concise arguments with confidence.
- Negotiation: finding common ground and building consensus among diverse viewpoints.
- Teamwork: collaborating effectively with peers towards a common goal.
- Problem Solving: analyzing complex issues and developing creative solutions.

The months leading up to the conference involve a significant commitment from both students and Faculty Advisors. We're fortunate to have a team of experienced advisors leading the HMUN program this year. All four advisors, Maria Antonieta Fernández, Alejandro Rivas, Tomás Parra, and Enrique Leizaola, are graduates of Universidad Metropolitana and possess vast experience in MUN-like activities conducted entirely in English. Goooo Science! 2nd Graders Become Mixing Masters!



On April 16th, our curious 2nd graders donned their lab coats (well, maybe just their imaginations!) for a super fun, hands-on Science Activity. They embarked on a mission to crack the code of physical and chemical changes in matter!

So, what's the difference between the two? It's all about how the stuff we see around us transforms. Imagine your favorite superhero costume. During a physical change, the costume might get ripped or stained (like when you take a tumble on the playground!), but it's still the same material underneath.

In our activity, the students became artists! They used white cardboard and whipped up a colorful masterpiece with shaving cream and paint. The cardboard itself didn't change, it just got a cool new look – a perfect example of a physical change!



But science gets even more exciting when things take a chemical turn. This happens when we mix ingredients and create something entirely new! The students pondered what might happen when you combine certain things, like filling a balloon... without using your mouth!

Hold onto your hats! When baking soda and vinegar were mixed, a fizzy reaction took place, creating bubbles and gas that filled the balloon attached to the experiment. This bubbly brew is a classic example of a chemical change!

Our junior scientists also explored how heat can change things up. They saw how liquid batter transformed into a delicious, fluffy waffle when cooked in a waffle maker. Not only did the shape and texture change, but they could also smell the amazing aroma and see the steam rising – all signs of a yummy chemical change in action!

This science activity was a blast, proving that learning about the world around us can be fun and delicious! Who knows, maybe these 2nd graders will be the next generation of scientists making amazing discoveries!
