2024 marked a historic milestone for Washington Academy (WA) as a dedicated group of parents and high school students embarked on an exciting, challenging journey: the creation of our school's first-ever Gaitas group! For those unfamiliar with this vibrant Venezuelan tradition, inter-school Gaitas festivals are a highly anticipated cultural phenomenon in Caracas. These energetic musical competitions, featuring high school students, have become a beloved part of youth culture in the city.



The story of school gaitas began over three decades ago as a simple Christmas activity. Students showcased their musical talents through performances of traditional Venezuelan songs, primarily gaitas and aguinaldos (Christmas carols). However, what began as humble school performances has evolved into a high-octane, professionalized spectacle. Imagine a blend of "Glee" and a Latin American musical tradition, infused with intense, friendly rivalry!



From homemade costumes to designer outfits, amateur strumming to meticulously choreographed routines, and simple school halls to televised spectacles, the transformation has been remarkable. Schools now invest in professional musicians, choreographers, and costume designers months in advance. The music itself has also evolved, blending traditional gaitar hythms with modern beats like reggaeton, hip-hop, and musical classics creating electrifying performances that have attracted major sponsors and TV cameras.

This year, WA joined this vibrant tradition! A courageous group of parents and students organized auditions open to students from 9th Grade and up. To ensure top-notch quality, they also hired professional coaches specializing in dance, percussion, singing, and harmony. 



This event marked the official start of Caracas' inter-school Gaitas Festival period. Throughout the season, Gaitas Washington not only impressed with their musical talent but also demonstrated a generous spirit, donating toys to the Alcaldía de Baruta's Operación Juguete program.

Their commitment proved worth it when they took home an impressive 41 awards during the entire season! Here's a recap of their impressive achievements:













### Preschoolers Embark on a Robotics and Programming Adventure!

On October 2nd, our youngest learners took their first exciting steps into the world of robotics and programming! As part of our commitment to providing cutting-edge education, we've incorporated the innovative Kurios Preschool Curriculum into our PK through 1st Grade program.

#### What is Kurios Education Platform?

Kurios Education Platform is a leading provider of STEM-based educational programs and resources (STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). They specialize in robotics education and have expanded to include other technological tools to enhance learning experiences. Their platform is designed to foster curiosity, critical thinking, and innovation among learners of all ages. Kurios empowers students to become active participants in their own learning journeys.



Our preschool students (PK through 1st Grade) are now attending weekly 30-minute computer lab sessions, guided by our Computers / Design teacher and supported by their individual grade's teacher assistant. These sessions, aligned with the Kurios curriculum, introduce our young learners to the fundamentals of robotics and programming.

To ensure our teachers are well-equipped, Kurios provided comprehensive professional development training for our Computers / Design teacher at the Caracas Campus. Additionally, we have a dedicated Kurios coach who is available to support our teachers and students throughout the year. The Kurios platform offers a wealth of digital resources, including planning tools, assessment criteria, and a chatbox for questions and comments.

During their first class, our preschoolers explored the exciting world of Knex kits and booklets. They engaged in activities that fostered visual association and fine motor skills, laying the foundation for future robotics and programming explorations.

#### A Note on Extracurricular Programs

It's important to note that this new curricular program is distinct from the extracurricular robotics and programming programs also offered by Kurios to our elementary students. While both programs share the goal of fostering STEM skills, they differ in their scope and intensity.

We are thrilled to embark on this new educational journey with Kurios. By integrating robotics and programming into our early childhood curriculum, we are empowering our youngest learners to become innovative thinkers and problem-solvers.

- Tallit: A prayer shawl often worn during morning prayers.
- Tefillin: Small leather boxes containing scrolls of Scripture, worn by observant Jewish men during morning prayers.

Sebastián expertly explained the significance and usage of each item, providing historical context and personal insights. This immersive experience not only enriched the students' understanding of ancient history, but also fostered a deeper appreciation for cultural diversity.
